Webs of Support Colour of the Month - Violet



The colour violet represents social norms. Social norms influence the entire web. These are attitudes, behaviors and understanding common to and accepted by a large number of people and influence how they act. Social norms can be long standing in communities – the way things have always been. They can also change over time or change quickly and unexpectedly due to economic factors or even "Acts of God" like tornadoes or wildfires.

Social norms can be positive. For example, communities who believe education is important and rally around and participate in school events, will likely have a large number of their children attending school regularly and graduating. As another example, communities who believe in protecting the environment and having a clean place to live will participate in activities like organic cart and recycling programs, litter-less lunch days at school and businesses, as well as community litter clean up events.

Social norms can also be negative. For example, communities that are accepting of youth having unsupervised bush parties may have higher incidences of youth who are using alcohol or drugs or engaging in risky behaviours. Another example may be communities with norms revolving around justice being obtained regardless of how it is done, may have higher rates of crime and violence.

Webs of support can filter negative social norms and reinforce positive ones. One never knows when the "winds" of social norms will blow in change. What we do know is youth who are thickly webbed, and their anchors who are also thickly webbed, will fare better in any "storm" than those without thick webs. We often can't foresee when social norms will change. Youth need to be thickly webbed in order to survive the sinkers that can come from negative social norms. In addition, adult anchors who have thick webs of their own will be better prepared to assist youth should social norms change.

Communities that are close-knit and focused on building thick webs can withstand "winds of change" better than thinly webbed ones. Consider how you can work toward thickening the webs among people in your community.
